# MACRO ECONOMIC UPDATE



### GLOBAL

- Global economic recovery continued in July on the back of steady progress in vaccine rollout and the easing of restrictions on activity in major developed markets. However, the spread of the more contagious Delta variant of Covid-19 subdued the optimism on the pace of the global economic recovery marginally.
- The US 10-year Treasury continued its decline in July, falling below 1.2% at some point during the month driven by lower expectations for future economic growth. However, global bonds returned 1.3% for the period. Equities on the other hand took a cue from the bond market even as growth stocks returned 2.9%, benefitting from the decline in yields while value stocks returned 0.7% for the month.
- Overall, the US market led the way with a 2.4% return for the month. However, emerging markets underperformed with a return of -6.7%, impacted by weak performance from China where announcements of tighter regulation for several sectors triggered a sharp decline in stock prices.

#### **DOMESTIC**

- Headline inflation declined for the third consecutive month in June to 17.75% y/y. Despite the decline, headline inflation remains at its highest level since February 2017. The moderation was on the back of the 45bps decline in food inflation to 21.83% while core inflation eased by 6bps for the first time this year to 13.09%.
- The moderation in food inflation has primarily been due to base effects as well as the waning pandemic induced shocks. Similarly, core inflation eased on the back of the reduction in prices of Housing, Water, Electricity, Gas and other fuels index.
- The CBN's Monetary Policy Committee held its 137<sup>th</sup> meeting in July wherein, it resolved to hold the monetary policy rate and all other policy parameters constant to enable the continued permeation of current policy measures in supporting growth and macro-economic stability. In addition, the CBN stated that it would no longer sell foreign exchange and issue new licenses to Bureau De Change operators. The aim of the move by the apex bank is to reign in speculative demand and ensure genuine demands are met.

# FINANCIAL MARKET UPDATE

### **EQUITIES**

- The NGX ASI took a different turn after two consecutive months of recording losses to close the month in the positive territory. The market recorded a performance of +1.69% in July while the year-to-date performance remains in a loss of -4.28%.
- The bourse was largely dominated by domestic investors with the foreign players largely on the sidelines. Market activity picked up during the month as investors reacted to the impressive half year financial results released within the month.
- July's Performance was driven by gains in the Oil & Gas (+20.40%), Industrial goods (+4.64%) and Banking (+4.06%) indices despite losses recorded by the Insurance (-2.98%) and Consumer goods (-0.54%) indices, respectively.
- Specifically, the market's performance was on the back of gains in Dangcem (+12.26%), Seplat (+11.59%), Access (+8.24%), Wapco (+7.76%) and Zenith (+2.72%)

### **FIXED INCOME**

- The fixed income market maintained bullish sentiments in July. The money market rate indicators Open Buy Back (OBB) and Overnight rates declined by 401bps and 399bps to 12.70% and 13.20% respectively, mirroring improved liquidity within the financial system in July. The improved liquidity within the system was on the back of the July 2021 bond maturity estimated at ₩561billion, coupons and maturities from NTB and OMO instruments within the month.
- In the treasury bills market, subscriptions remained strong at the NTB auctions held during the month, as stop rates on the 364-day paper declined 120bps to close at 8.20%. However, at the secondary market, average rate on treasury bills increased by 10bps to 6.63% driven by c.50bps increase in yields at the short to mid point of the curve as some investors sought to exit positions.
- In the FGN Bond market, average yields at the secondary market declined by 46bps to 11.65% as demand rose for the instruments. At the monthly bond auction, the DMO introduced two new bond maturities 2028 and 2036 which closed at 12.35% and 13.15% respectively. However, stop rates on the 2050 maturity declined by 45bps to 13.25%. Subscriptions at the auction was strong at 1.91x the offer size..

# **OUTLOOK**



#### **GLOBAL MARKETS**

With the expectation of continued global economic recovery and more economies easing restrictions in the coming months, we see the recent spread of delta variant posing a major risk and potentially slowing the trajectory of expected recovery. Nonetheless, governments are likely to speed up the inoculation of citizens to reduce the spread of the variant and disruptions to economies.

A couple of factors such as US President Biden's proposed infrastructure spending bill and FED's policy reaction to rising inflation will likely determine the trajectory of the bond yields in the coming months. Stocks on the other hand remain near record highs on the back of stronger earnings and declining yields. However, further escalation of the delta variant could result in sell-offs

#### **DOMESTIC MARKETS**

#### **EQUITY**

In the coming month, we expect market to trade sideways, with pockets of investors reacting positively to companies (especially banks) set to release their audited half year financial result in August and likely declare interim dividends. However, we expect the retail players to dominate activity in the bourse as investors remain cautious whilst taking a cue from the direction of fixed income yields.

#### **FIXED INCOME**

Financial system liquidity is expected to moderate in the near term, overlaid with marginally improved demand thereby keeping yields range bound in the near term. However, as inflation remains elevated, with continuous supply from FG, coupled with lower maturity profile, the demand seen in July is expected to dissipate, consequently leading to improved yield level as we move into the rest of the year.

### **MONEY MARKET**

Money market rates declined across the curve in July contrary to elevated rates seen in the past month. This was as a result of improved system liquidity during the month, increased demand from local investors for government securities and limited investment options available to mop up excess liquidity.

Going into the new month, we expect rates to stay relatively stable. This stems from the likely weak demand and uncertainties regarding yield direction which would put most participants on the side-lines. Liquidity is expected to stabilize as NTB and OMO maturities are being rolled over by the CBN.
