MACRO ECONOMIC UPDATE



GLOBAL

- The conflict between Russia and Ukraine took center stage during the month, leading to uncertainties around growth expectations of economies, thereby dampening anticipations of rate hikes by global monetary policy authorities amidst eminent inflationary pressures.
- The economic impact of the conflict began to reflect on commodity prices early, with Russia being a significant exporter of commodities (accounting for 13% of global crude oil production, 17% of natural gas production and about one tenth of global wheat supplies. For context, Brent crude oil reached a 7-year high, crossing the \$100 per barrel mark while European natural gas prices rose 15% during the month, thus exacerbating inflationary worries.
- Equity and Fixed income markets were volatile during the month, largely impacted by the geopolitical tensions. Growth stocks declined by 3.5% while Value stocks outperformed despite a decline of 1.6%. Also, developed market equities declined 2.5% outperforming their emerging market counterparts that declined 3%. On the fixed income front, US treasuries declined by 0.7% as investors sold off equities and rotated funds to low risk fixed income securities.

DOMESTIC

- According to the National Bureau of Statistics, the fourth quarter GDP printed at 3.98% y/y indicating the fifth consecutive quarter of growth for the Nigerian economy. The growth was on the back of the 4.73% y/y expansion recorded in the non-oil sector underpinned by growth in sub-sectors such as Agriculture, trade and services. However, the oil sector remained in a contraction for the seventh consecutive quarter recording a decline of -8.06% y/y due to technical and operational problems resulting in lower oil production.
- Headline inflation opened the year lower, moderating marginally by 3-basis point to 15.60% y/y as a result of high base effects. The moderation was mainly on the back of the 24-basis point decline in food inflation to 17.13% y/y reflective of the waning demand spurred by year end festivities. However, core inflation remained flat at 13.87% y/y.
- The Stanbic IBTC Nigeria PMI rose to 57.3 in February from 53.7 the previous month, indicating the strongest expansion in private sector activity since November 2019. This improvement was as a result of quicker expansions in output, new orders, employment and purchases.

FINANCIAL MARKET UPDATE

EQUITIES

- The equities market maintained an upward trend for the second consecutive month albeit at a slower pace. The market recorded a gain of +1.65% for the month of February, whilst the quarter to date and year to date returns both stood at +10.95%.
- The audited financial results released during the month especially the results of the commercial banks and the relatively attractive dividends declared spurred some bullish sentiments in the markets. Also, stocks in the oil and gas sector recorded gains in reaction to the rally in energy prices sparked off by the tension between Russia and Ukraine.
- Notably, market's performance was driven by gains in Seplat (+8.85%), Total (+9.91%), Guinness (+40.06%), Dangcem (+4.95%), Presco (+7.72%) and Conoil (+20.73%) amidst losses in Airtel (-0.87%), Okomu (-4.93%) and BUA Foods (-4.66%).

FIXED INCOME

- The Fixed Income market was characterized by bullish sentiments during the month, buoyed by high liquidity within the financial system. Reflective of this, the money market indicators Open Buy Back and Overnight rates declined by 305 basis points and 321 basis points to 6.29% and 6.70% respectively.
- At the primary auction held for Treasury Bills within the month, strong demand persisted, resulting in the auction being 5.23x oversubscribed. Average yield declined by 52 basis points, driven by the decline in yields on the 91-day and 364-day maturities. Similarly, average yield at the secondary market for Treasury Bills declined by 23 basis point to 4.13%.
- Also in the Bonds market, demand was sturdy, as the Bond auction held during the month was oversubscribed by 3.72x, resulting in a 28-basis point decline in average yield. At the secondary market, average yield declined by 16 basis points to 11.01% driven by yield moderation at the short to mid point of the curve.


FUND OBJECTIVE



OUTLOOK



GLOBAL MARKETS

The geopolitical tensions between Russia and Ukraine is expected to remain the focal point in the coming month. Investors would be watching the reaction of global monetary authorities to higher energy prices with respect to the aggressiveness of rate hikes to combat inflation or slow down the pace of tightening in a bid to support the economy considering the possible impact of the tensions on the global economy. Also, we expect volatility in the financial markets to persist as investors continue to seek a haven for their investments amidst uncertainties surrounding the geopolitical tensions.

DOMESTIC MARKETS

EQUITY

With the end of the 2021 financial year earnings season fast approaching, we expect a slow down in market activity given that most companies have released their results and declared dividends. The retail speculators are likely to be the most active participants while profit taking dominates the scene of the local bourse. Nonetheless, investors would be watching closely the direction of yields in the fixed income space as a cue for risk appetite.

FIXED INCOME

We expect demand for fixed income instruments to be sturdy in the coming month, thus fueling bullish sentiments. This expectation is premised on the increased maturities hitting the financial system within the month. Consequently, yields on fixed income instruments are expected to remain low with interests mostly at the short end of the yield curve.

MONEY MARKET

Going into the new month, we expect liquidity to be sustained from the previous month and increase further on the back of high maturities hitting the system. Rates increased marginally in mid February and traded range bound; we expect similar sentiments in March as continued demand is maintained from investors seeking to invest idle funds. The direction of yields would be influenced by demand and supply of money market instruments and FG's borrowings.
