

Mutual Funds Factsheet April 2022

MACRO ECONOMIC UPDATE



GLOBAL

- A combination of the tensions between Russia and Ukraine, rising covid cases in China and persistent rise in inflation resulting in the prospect of a substantially tighter monetary policy all weighed negatively on the global economy during the month.
- Headline inflation in the US reached 8.5%, the highest level since 1981 resulting in the market pricing in a 50-basis point hike at each of the FED's next three meetings. Also, retail sales data in the UK declined 1.4% month on month and flash purchasing manager's index fell more than anticipated. In China, the province of Shanghai was on lockdown for most of April to contain the spread of the virus.
- Global equities continued a downward trend with MSCI World index falling by -8% in the month. Both value and growth stocks were in the red, with growth stocks posting a substantial loss of -11.9%. Global commodities outperformed, with a gain of 4.1%. Fixed income returns came under pressure with global bonds returning -5.5% due to sell offs.

DOMESTIC

- Headline inflation for March rose by 22 basis point to 15.92% y/y, making it the second consecutive month of an increase. The northward trend in inflation is premised on the rise in food inflation, despite the moderation in core inflation.
- For context, food inflation rose by 9 basis point to 17.20% driven by higher prices of bread, cereal, potatoes, yam, oils and fat. This is likely a pass-through effect of higher commodity prices as well as rising cases of insecurity in the northern region. On the other hand, core inflation declined 10 basis point to 13.91% following the slower rise in prices of other items excluding food and energy.
- Stanbic IBTC Nigeria's PMI for April rose to 55.8 from 54.1 recorded the previous month, pointing to a sharp improvement in business conditions in the private sector. The improvement was driven by the acceleration in the rates of expansion in output and new orders following stronger demand. On the price front, inflation exacerbated costs of raw materials.

FINANCIAL MARKET UPDATE

EQUITIES

- The equities market returned to the positive territory in April, starting the second quarter on a strong note. The market recorded a gain of 5.69% for the month and the quarter, on the back of bullish sentiments dominating the scene of the bourse. Consequently, the year-to-date return jumped to an impressive +16.21%.
- The demand for equities increased during the month, resulting in a rally in prices as investors sought to reinvest dividends received in bellwether stocks. Also, positive reaction by investors to impressive first quarter financial results and corporate actions such as the approval of the super agent license for Airtel Africa drove demand.
- Market performance was supported by the gains recorded by all sectorial indices during the month with the Oil & Gas index (+19.06%) leading the pack, followed by Consumer goods (+11.54%), Banking (+6.24%), Insurance (+3.71%) and Industrial goods (+3.25%) indices, respectively. Specifically, gains were recorded in Seplat (+29.03%), Airtel (+9.97%), Nestle (+3.23%), Guinness (+30.62%) and Dangcem (+6.91%).

FIXED INCOME

- The sentiments in the fixed income market was slightly bearish in April, reflecting a relatively lower level of liquidity within the financial system. Consequently, the money market indicators Open Buy Back and Overnight Rates rose by an average 173 basis point and 172 basis points to 8.25% and 8.77% respectively
- Similarly, at the primary market auctions for Treasury Bills, demand moderated by c.53% resulting in average stop rates rising by 14 basis point to 3.15%, with the increase noticed at the 364-day paper. Also, average yield at the secondary market rose slightly by 9 basis points to 3.43%.
- At the monthly bond auction, the Debt Management Office introduced a new 10-year instrument (FGN 2032) whilst the FGN 2025 maturity was re-opened. The stop yield on the 20-year paper (2042) rose by 20 basis points to 12.90%, consequently increasing average yield at the auction by 34 basis points amidst weaker demand across all maturities on offer. Likewise, at the secondary market, average yields rose by 44 basis points to 11.03%.





GLOBAL MARKETS

The global economy continues to be faced with potential risks stemming from the impact of geopolitical tensions and rising inflation amidst the improvements in labor markets and relatively strong consumer wallet. Furthermore, investors would be closely watching the reaction of monetary authorities to rising inflation with respect to rate hike actions and this should continue to fuel volatility in the financial markets. Therefore, we expect a further rise in fixed income yields as investors continue to price-in possible rate hikes to address inflationary pressures by the monetary authorities.

DOMESTIC MARKETS

EQUITY

The strong demand witnessed during the month has pushed stock prices higher and, in some cases, to record levels. Consequently, we expect to see some bouts of profit taking given the round up of the first quarter earnings season for most of the bellwethers. Retail speculative investors are likely to dominate market activities whilst the institutional investors remain largely on the sidelines whilst watching the direction of yields at the fixed income market.

FIXED INCOME

We expect further moderation in the demand for fixed income securities, underpinned by the lower maturity profile in the coming month. In addition, a further rise in inflation could result in the demand for higher yields by investors to improve the real return on their investments. Therefore, we expect an upward trend in fixed income yields to persist, as the federal government continues to borrow domestically to fund the budget deficit.

MONEY MARKET

Going into the new month, we expect rates in the money market space to remain on the rise on the back of lesser maturities hitting the system.
