# MACRO ECONOMIC UPDATE



#### GLOBAL

- The global economy remains faced with the intertwining impact of monetary policy actions of global central banks and the unabating tensions between Russia and Ukraine. The latter has continued to exacerbate global inflationary pressures due to elevated commodity prices amidst worsening supply chain disruptions.
- In a bid to contain inflationary pressures, global monetary authorities remained committed to rate hikes. The US FED raised benchmark interest rates by 75 basis point at its June meeting, marking the biggest rate hike since 1994. Similarly, the Bank of England hiked policy rate for the fifth consecutive time by 25 basis points to 1.25%, the highest since January 2009. Switzerland's Central Bank also raised rate by 50 basis points, the first-rate hike in nearly 15 years due to inflation fears.
- Global stocks suffered huge losses as investors responded to the aggressive interest rate hikes by global central banks which ignited recession fears. In the US, DJIA and S & P declined by 6.71% m/m and 8.39% m/m respectively. Similarly, the European markets ended in the red as FTSE (-5.76% m/m) and Stoxx 600 (-8.15% m/m) came under intense selling pressure. MSCI EM and FM also posted losses of 7.15% and 5.69% respectively.

#### DOMESTIC

- Nigerian Bureau of Statistic published the Foreign Trade report for the first quarter of 2022, which showed trade balance printed a surplus of NGN1.2tn compared to the deficit of NGN1.9tn in Q1 2022.
- The sturdy improvement in the trade balance was driven by the faster growth in exports (+138% YoY to NGN7.1tn) relative to imports (+20.4% YoY to NGN5.9tn). The growth in exports was driven by higher crude oil exports, a fallout of the rally in crude oil prices induced by Russia/Ukraine conflict.
- Headline inflation rose further by 89 basis point to 17.71% y/y in May (April 16.82%), the highest rate since June 2021 (17.75%), driven by broad-based increases across the food (+113bps) and core (+72bps) baskets. Food inflation accelerated to 19.5% YoY, reflective of the continued impact of security challenges in food producing regions, rising cost of importing fertilisers and associated logistics costs. Similarly, core inflation rose to 14.90% y/y driven by the pass-through impact of elevated energy prices, rising commodity prices and scarcity of foreign exchange.

### FINANCIAL MARKET UPDATE

#### EQUITIES

- Negative sentiments dominated the local bourse in the month of June as investors exhibited risk-off sentiments in response to expectation of higher FI yields amidst the absence of positive triggers in the macro space. Overall, the All Share Index recorded a loss of 3.39% for the month, whilst quarter to date return stood at 10.33%. Consequently, the year-to-date performance of the market moderated to +21.31% from +25.57% at the end of May.
- Following the rally witnessed in the first two months of the quarter, investors booked profits on positions in June as bearish sentiments dominated the market. Further supporting the profit taking spree was the expectation for a higher yield environment in the fixed income market on the back of the monetary policy committee's aggressive rate hike action at its meeting in May.
- Pricesly, the market's bearish performance was on the back of losses in NB (-15.15%), GTCO (-10.48%), ZENITH (9.01%), UBA (-5.70%), WAPCO (-4.69%), BUACEMENT (-3.16%), ACCESS (-2.63%) and AIRTEL AFRICA (-1.26%)

#### **FIXED INCOME**

- System liquidity remained tight in the month of June, closing the last week of June with NGN329.7bn deficit. Mixed sentiments trailed the fixed income market on the back of tighter system liquidity, continued reaction to the 150bps hike in MPR by the CBN in May and efforts by the DMO to manage borrowing cost for the government. In the money market, liquidity tightened as the Overnight rates rose by an average of 182 basis point to 11.55%.
- At the NTB primary auction, average stop rate declined across all tenors relative to the prior month. For context, as at June 2022, the stop rates on the 91-day, 182-day and 364-day bills moderated to 2.40% (May: 2.50%), 3.79% (May: 3.89%) and 6.07% (May: 6.49%) respectively, with the highest decrease (0.42%) seen on the 364-day paper. At the secondary market, average yields across the 91-day, 182-day and 364-day bill rose by 61 basis points to 4.50%.
- Conversely, average stop rate at the Bond auctions rose marginally by 10 basis points to 11.92% as of June 2022 (May- 11.82%) as investors demanded for higher yields in the face of elevated inflationary pressures in order to improve real returns. At the secondary market, average yields declined slightly by 4 basis points to 11.17%





#### FUND STRUCTURE





#### FUND OBJECTIVE



#### **GLOBAL MARKETS**

Global central banks will be faced with the daunting task of balancing recession risks induced by tightening of monetary policy against the need to contain elevated inflationary pressures. The ongoing spat between Russia and Ukraine will continue to exert upward pressures commodity prices. As a result, consumers income will likely remain under pressure due to rising cost of living emanating from soaring inflationary pressures. Furthermore, investors will be watching the turn of events in the UK following the resignation of its prime minister. In the same vein, we think investors will be paying close attention to economic data (CPI and Non-farm payrolls) in the US to gauge the policy move of the Federal Reserve at its meeting scheduled for 26<sup>th</sup> and increasing Covid numbers across the globe. That said, we expect continued volatility in the financial markets as investors continue to assess the response of global central banks to rising inflation against indications of a slowing global economy.

#### **DOMESTIC MARKETS**

#### EQUITY

We expect strong contest between the bulls and the bears in the coming months, hinged on the continuation of intermittent profit taking into the month and stints of bargain hunting activities ahead of H2-22 earnings season. We expect domestic investors to remain the dominant players in the market as FPIs remain largely on the sidelines due to liquidity constraints in the FX market and frail macro conditions. That said, we believe the muted activity of FPIs will be centred on fungible stocks as a vehicle of exiting the domestic market.

#### **FIXED INCOME**

We believe yield expectations will remain skewed to the upside following the 150bps hike in MPR implemented by the CBN in May. Accordingly, we expect aversion for long-dated instruments to persist. With the current unfavourable pricing in the Eurobond market, we expect the federal government to increase supply of debt instruments in a bid to finance the deficit in the 2022 budget. Considering the persistent rise in inflationary pressures, we expect investors' bid rate at auctions to inch higher as they attempt to improve real returns.

#### **MONEY MARKET**

We expect rates in the money market space to trend higher due to the lower level of liquidity expected to hit the financial system amidst the tight liquidity management approach to be adopted by the CBN.
