MACRO ECONOMIC UPDATE



GLOBAL

- Buoyed by the recent slowdown in the pace of inflation rate, the expectation of a soft landing has emerged, as the US Q4 2022 GDP performance (+2.9%) trounced the estimated +2.8%, and the 0.1% performance recorded in the Euro-area, thus spurring capital market sentiments
- The Federal Reserve, however, continued its hawkish monetary policy trend as it hiked policy rate by 0.25% in January. Likewise, the European Central Bank (ECB) hiked rate by 50bps in January as they continued to combat inflation in the region amid the ongoing war in Eastern Europe
- We observed sustained optimism in markets across North America and Europe in January, as NASDAQ, S&P 500, STOXX, CAC40, DAX, and RUSSEL 100 indices all posted positive results in the period.
- In Asia Pacific, the Chinese government continued to relax the zero-covid policy that grounded the economy in 2022, while in Japan, the yen continues to plummet as rate hikes persist in other advanced economies.
- In January, we noted the drop in OPEC's crude production volume by 60,000bpd, underpinned majorly by a 100,000bpd decline in Saudi's output.

DOMESTIC

- The CBN extends the deadline for depositing the older version of the NGN200, NGN500, and NGN1000 notes to February 10, 2023, amid concerns about the elevated probabilities of massive default. The apex bank has also stated that notes not deposited before the deadline would be receivable at the central bank.
- Nigeria's crude oil production improved in December 2022, moving from 1.17mbpd in November to 1.27mbpd within the period, signaling improved outlook for accretion to the external reserve.
- Headline inflation continued to grow, posting 21.34% YoY in December 2022. This was a little shy off the November 2022 figure which posted at 21.47% YoY performance, the first disinflation reported in 11 eleven months.
- Purchasing Manager's Index for January, showed a slowdown in economic activities within the expansion region, as it fell to 53.5 from an eight months high of 54.6 in December 2022.

FINANCIAL MARKET UPDATE

EQUITIES

- In January, we saw the bullish sentiment from December 2022 persists, as the NGX ASI recorded 4.39% ytd performance.
- On a sectoral basis, the Industrial (+2.14% ytd), Consumer Goods (+5.64% ytd), Oil and Gas (+5.41% ytd), Insurance (+5.36% ytd), and Banking (+7.51% ytd) sectors all closed in the positive territory.
- The positive performance can be attributed to a combination of bullish sentiments within the fixed income space given high liquidity, and the low valuations that has permeated the equities market in recent years.
- Major moves were largely seen on the NGX30, as investors sought to capitalize on the low valuations on bellwether tickers to mitigate the prevailing uncertainties in the market.

FIXED INCOME

- The sovereign fixed income market was largely bullish in January as elevated financial system liquidity overpowered issuances to force a downtrend. More than NGN3trn is expected to hit the market from coupons and maturities in Q1:2023.
- Average stop rates at the NTB auctions in January dipped significantly to 2.29% from the 6.13% recorded at the last auction in December 2022. The 182-day instrument declined the most in the period by 535bps. This bullish sentiment was also reflected in the secondary NT-Bills market as average rates in the month had declined to 2.79%.
- The FGN Bonds market also recorded similar developments, albeit at a lower magnitude, considering that average yields at the primary market auction held in January declined to 14.90% from 15.05% in December 2022. Average yields in the secondary market also closed lower at 13.35%, as yields on bonds at the short end of the curve declined significantly.

GLOBAL MARKETS

Although recent developments within the global economy with respect to inflation and Q3:2022 GDP performances have spurred significant optimism, the inherent macroeconomic issues prevail. We observed that current CPI remains a far cry from the targeted 2% in the United States (US) for instance, and that energy cost outlook remains elevated. We believe that this development could anchor a recessionary turn, and given the trajectory of output and consumption, the chances of a recession in 2023 is still high. We also note that policy rate hikes would flow into the latter half of 2023.

DOMESTIC MARKETS

EQUITY

We expect that the low fixed income yield environment will incentivize a risk-on sentiment, which could engender further institutional rotation towards the equities market. This, coupled with the expectation of corporate actions should keep the space afloat in February 2023. We expect the traction from institutional investors to further deepen domestic participation in the local bourse.

FIXED INCOME

We expect liquidity to remain buoyant in Q1 2023 due to the significant maturity expected in the financial system and given that the financial system closed the year 2022 with high liquidity. As such, yields in the fixed income market are expected to moderate in February driven by significant demand from investors.

In that light, we expect issuers to take advantage of the envisaged yields decline in the fixed income market to raise debt capital from the market in order to finance their working capital requirements. Similarly, increased borrowing is expected from the DMO in Q1 driven by the recently assented record budget deficit.

Barring any significant liquidity management measures by the CBN, we expect demand for fixed income instruments to outweigh supply in February. We also believe that given the need to bring inflation rate under control, the probability of discretionary cash reserve injection into the economy is low.
