# MACRO ECONOMIC UPDATE



### GLOBAL

- The month of March was permeated by the inception of the banking crisis. The collapse of Silicon Valley and Signature Bank in the US led to the charge for what was about to be the reoccurrence of the 2008 financial crisis. Similarly, Credit Suisse was acquired by UBS in a USD3.25bn deal following its collapse. This spurred mixed sentiments in the global equities market which led to significant sell-offs in banking stocks. However, the US Fed and other major financial institutions weighed in by offering loans and deposits to challenged banks to meet up with customers' demands. This further eased the turmoil. However, hopes around the banking sector remain cloudy as investors take precautions by moving deposits to safe havens.
- Amid the banking crisis, the US Fed, Bank of England (BoE), and European Central Bank (ECB) further hiked interest rates by 25bps, 25bps and, 50bps, respectively. They are of the opinion that the battle against inflation has not been won yet.
- Markets across North America and Europe extended their bullish run in March. The S&P 500 (7.03%) STOXX (13.74%), CAC40 (13.11%), DAX (12.25%), and RUSSEL 1000 (7.00%) indices all posted positive year-to-date returns in March. Also, major indices in Asia, such as the Nikkei 225 (+7.46%) and SHCOMP (+5.94%) closed on a positive note.
- In the United States, the Personal Consumption Expenditures (PCE) price index increased 0.3% MoM and 5.0% YoY in February 2023. The core PCE price index which excludes volatile food and energy components, rose 0.3% MoM and 4.6% YoY in February 2023. Consumer spending rose 0.2% in February (vs 2.0% in January). We opine that the strong labour market continues to keep spending elevated despite the previous aggressive interest rate hikes embarked upon by the Fed.

#### **DOMESTIC**

- Nigeria's crude oil production slightly increased to 1.38mbpd in February 2023 from 1.31mbpd in January 2023 amid the government's continuous effort in combating oil theft and vandalism.
- Headline inflation continued to rise in February 2023, at 21.91% YoY compared to 21.82% YoY in January 2023. This is following the increase in the Food inflation sub-component, which rose to 24.35% YoY in February 2023 from 24.32% YoY in January 2023. However, on a month-on-month basis, Headline inflation tapered by 16bps to 1.71%.
- Purchasing Manager's Index for March slumped further to 42.3 points from 44.7 points in February 2023, representing the second consecutive contraction in economic activities in over two years. This mirrors the continuous effect of the cash crunch and fuel scarcity on economic activities in the period.

# FINANCIAL MARKET UPDATE

### **EQUITIES**

- The equities market sustained its bullish run in the first quarter of the year. The Nigerian bourse's year-to-date returns printed at 7.04% as the NGX ASI closed at 54,857.96pts. Although there was a slowdown in March as the Nigerian bourse lost 12 out of 23 trading days in March 2023 compared to 15 gains out of 20 trading days in February 2023.
- On a sectoral basis, year-to-date performance remained positive across all sectors under our coverage. The Industrial Goods (+6.05% ytd), Consumer Goods (+19.32% ytd), Oil and Gas (+10.45% ytd), Insurance (+1.81% ytd), and Banking (+8.50% ytd) sectors all closed on a positive note.
- Despite the decent performance in the equities market in March 2023, we saw a 1.85% decline in the bourse's year-to-date performance In the month (+7.04%) compared to February 2023 (8.89%). We opine that this is an offshoot of the recent rise in yields in the fixed income market owing to the 50bps hike in interest rate and profit-taking activities by investors in the equities market.

### FIXED INCOME

- The sovereign fixed income market continued its bearish momentum in March as Investors sought for higher rates at the primary auctions.
- Average stop rates at the NTB auctions in March surged to 7.02% from 3.13% for February auctions. This is following an uptrend in rates across all tenors, with the 364-day bill instruments rising the most (+529bps to 11.41%). The bearish sentiment at the primary auctions trickled down to the secondary NT-Bills market as average yield rose 370bps MoM to 7.73%.
- At the FGN Bonds primary market, average stop rate declined to 14.93% from 15.20% in February. However, in the secondary bonds market, average yields went up by 29bps to 13.56% as yields on bonds at the short end of the curve rose significantly.


#### **FUND STRUCTURE**

The primary objective of the Fund is to provide a steady stream of income to investors by investing in high-quality short-term money market instruments and government securities, which include; Banker's acceptances, certificates of deposits, commercial papers, Fixed Deposits with eligible financial institutions; Short term debt securities issued or guaranteed by the Government of Nigeria, Other instruments introduced and approved by the Central Bank of Nigeria (CBN) from time to time, Other money market or fixed income instruments in which the Fund is permitted to invest under the Trust Deed.

# **OUTLOOK**



### **GLOBAL MARKETS**

Given the recent banking crisis, we expect investors to continue to remain cautious in the equities market. We see more investors moving their deposits from small banks to larger banks in search of safety and higher returns on their deposits. We expect activities to remain positive albeit at a slower pace. On monetary policy, we do not expect major central banks to cut rates anytime soon. However, we see smaller rate hikes in the US, UK and ECB. Furthermore, given the recent announcement by OPEC+ to cut oil production by 1.16MMBPD, we expect oil prices to trend higher in the coming months.

### **DOMESTIC MARKETS**

# **EQUITY**

We expect mixed sentiments to permeate the equities market in April 2023. We base our prognosis on profit-taking activities from investors as volatility remains high in the market. Furthermore, given the significant rally that permeated the equities market in Q1 2023, we expect investors to embark on profit-taking as they strategize their market entry and exit position.

### **FIXED INCOME**

Given the significant maturity profile from maturing bonds in April, we expect robust liquidity towards the end of the month which should ordinarily drive demand for fixed income securities by investors. Consequently, we expect a moderation in yields.

The DMO has raised NGN1.99trn from FGN bonds so far this year and is expected to increase its borrowing, given the approved budget deficit for 2023. In the absence of incessant CRR debits by the CBN, we expect the demand for fixed income securities to exceed supply in the month of April.
