MACRO ECONOMIC UPDATE



GLOBAL

- The IMF in its latest forecast for the UK's economy projected a 0.4% YoY expansion compared to its previous projection of a 0.3% contraction. In addition, the UK's economy is expected to grow by 1.0% in 2024 on the back of resilient demand, stronger wage amid declining energy prices, and improved confidence.
- The strong US labor market continues to keep spending elevated despite the previous aggressive interest rate hikes embarked upon by the Fed. This is evidenced by the increase in Personal Consumption Expenditures (PCE) price index by 0.4% MoM and 4.4% YoY in April 2023.
- On May 31st, 2023, the bill to raise the US debt ceiling was passed by the Senate in a bid to avert sovereign debt default. The long-awaited passage was crucial and addressed concerns about the United States' ability to meet its debt obligations.
- In the US and Europe in May, the S&P 500 (+9.30%), STOXX (+6.07%), CAC40 (+8.35%) and DAX (+12..54%) indices all posted positive year-to-date returns. Similarly, major indices in Asia, such as the Nikkei 225 (+21.12%) and SHCOMP (+2.83%) closed on a positive note.

DOMESTIC

- In April 2023, Headline Inflation continued its uptrend as it added 18bps to settle at 22.22% YoY from 22.04% in March 2023. This represents the highest YoY increase since the index was rebased in 2009. Food inflation rose by 18bps while Core inflation increased by 28bps in the same period.
- Nigeria's crude oil production further declined to 1.18MMbpd in April 2023 from 1.35MMbpd in March 2023. On the other hand, Brent price averaged US\$83.37/bbl in April, higher than the average of US\$79.21/bbl in March.
- Nigeria's GDP for Q1 2023 slowed to 2.31% YoY from 3.52% in Q4 2022. This represents the tenth expansion on a quarter-on-quarter basis since H2 2020. The Oil sector contracted by 4.21% YoY (vs -13.38% YoY in Q4 2022) while the Non-oil sector advanced by 2.77% YoY (vs 4.44% YoY in Q4 2022).
- At the 291st Monetary Policy Committee (MPC) meeting, the committee voted for a 50bps raise in Monetary Policy Rate (MPR) to 18.50%, citing elevated inflationary pressures. The third consecutive hike in 2023.
- In April 2023, Nigeria's Purchasing Managers Index (PMI) settled at 53.8 points from 42.3 points in March. This indicates an expansion in the private sector business condition for the first time in 3 months.
- Nigeria's newly elected President announced the removal of fuel subsidy, leading to higher PMS prices across the country. In addition, the government announced the unification of his official exchange rate windows at the inaugural speech.

FINANCIAL MARKET UPDATE

EQUITIES

- In May, the stock market closed strongly positive, following the newly elected President's speech on market-oriented reforms. The market recorded monthly return of 6.5%, pushing the year-to-date performance to 8.8% from the 2.3% in April 2023.
- On a sectoral basis, year-to-date performance was positive across all sectors under our coverage. The Industrial Goods (+3.53% YtD), Consumer Goods (+44.00% YtD), Oil and Gas (+28.87% YtD), Insurance (+19.88% YtD), and Banking (+25.38% YtD) sectors all closed on a positive note.

FIXED INCOME

- In May 2023, the secondary Fixed Income market closed bullish as average yield shed 65bps MoM to settle at 10.07%. This is the lowest since 31 March 2023.
- Average stop rates at the NTB auctions in May dipped 283bps to 5.87% from 8.70% in April. This is following improved demand as indicated by the 105bps surge in average bid-to-cover ratio to 5.10x (vs 4.05x in April 2023). Similarly, the secondary NT-Bills market ended the month on a bullish note as average yield declined by 112bps MoM to 6.18%.
- At the FGN Bonds primary market auction for May, average stop rate climbed 12bps to 15.12% (vs 15.00% in April). However, at the secondary bonds market, closed the month negative as average yield advanced by 17bps MoM to 13.96%.

FUND OBJECTIVE



OUTLOOK



GLOBAL MARKETS

Anticipating a shift in momentum, we predict a slowdown in the recent upward trend observed in the US 2-year and 10-year bond yields after the passage of the bill to raise the US debt ceiling. Additionally, we foresee the US Federal Reserve adopting a wait and see approach at the next policy meeting.

In Euro-Area, we expect the European Central Bank to continue hiking interest rate, albeit at a modest pace of 25 basis points. Furthermore, there is a general expectation of a global decline in economic growth, partly influenced by the subsiding energy prices in comparison to the previous year. This overall decline is likely to have an impact on various sectors and markets worldwide.

On this note, we expect investors to increase their exposure to risky assets as they reassess the impact of the raised debt ceiling and expected temporary pause in rate hike by the US Fed.

DOMESTIC MARKETS

EQUITY

We expect strong positive sentiments to permeate the equities market in June as market anticipates positive economic reforms from the new government. Possible sectors to benefit from these reforms include telecoms, banking, industrial goods, and oil & gas, etc.

FIXED INCOME

The substantial liquidity in the financial system is expected to keep fixed income yields depressed in the near term, further supported by the positive momentum in the equities market. To this end, investors will benefit from credit spreads on corporate issuances
