

Mutual Funds Factsheet June 2023

MACRO ECONOMIC UPDATE



GLOBAL

- According to the US Bureau of Labor Statistics, the headline Consumer Price Index (CPI) in the US grew by 4.0% in May 2023 (vs 4.9% YoY in April 2023). This marks the smallest YoY increase since March 2021. On a month-onmonth (MoM) basis, the CPI rose by 0.10% in May 2023, compared to 0.40% in April 2023. In response to this slowdown in inflation, the Federal Reserve (Fed) announced a pause in its benchmark rate hikes during its latest policy meeting, indicating a potential end to its hawkish stance.
- According to the UK Office of National Statistics (ONS), the headline CPI in the UK grew by 8.70% YoY in May 2023, (same as April 2023). On a MoM basis, it increased by 0.70% (same as April 2023). While other economies are experiencing disinflationary trends, Inflation in the UK remained stubborn following elevated energy and food prices. Consequently, the Bank of England raised rates by 50bps to 5.00% in June 2023, marking the highest level since the credit crisis of 2008. This hike represents the thirteenth consecutive increase by the Bank.
- Despite concerns surrounding the raising of US debt ceiling earlier in the quarter, high interest rates environment and recessionary fears, the global equities market closed relatively bullish as . Major indices under our coverage closed H1:2023 in the positive territory. The S&P 500 (+15.91%) STOXX (+15.96%), FTSE 100 (+1.07%), S&P/TSX (+3.97%) Nikkei 225 (+27.19%) and SHCOMP (+3.65%) indices all closed on a positive note.

DOMESTIC

- Nigeria's crude oil production grew to 1.27MMbpd in May from 1.10MMbpd in April 2023. This is still below the 1.80MMbpd quota provided by the OPEC and the 1.69MMbpd benchmark for the Federal Government's budget.
- Headline inflation for May jumped to 22.41% YoY from 22.22% YoY in April. This marks the fifth (5th) consecutive increase since December 2022. The increase is on the back of a jump in Food inflation (+21bps) to 24.82% YoY. However, Core inflation tapered by 8bps to 20.06% YoY. On a MoM basis, Headline inflation (+3bps to 1.94%), Food inflation (+6bps to 2.19%) and Core inflation (+35bps to 1.81%) all recorded increases.
- In May 2023, Nigeria's Purchasing Managers Index (PMI) rose to 54.0 points (vs 53.8 points in April 2023). This is the highest PMI figure since the beginning of the year and indicates that the private sector has sustained its recovery from the cash crisis at the beginning of the year.
- In June 2023, the CBN announced the unification of the foreign exchange window. This is in line with the policies of the new administration. Currently, the Naira is on a free-float and the exchange rate is determined by market forces of demand and supply and the apex bank has no influence on the exchange rate. As of June 30th 2023, the I&E FX window closed at US\$769.30/NI.

FINANCIAL MARKET UPDATE

EQUITIES

- The local bourse closed in the positive territory in June, sustaining the rally in May, as year-to-date return closed higher by 10.1% to 18.9%.
- This was driven by pro-market remarks made by the newly elected president during his inaugural speech on subsidy removal and the liberalization of operations in the FX market. As a result, the market gained on 12 out of 19 trading days of the month, as the NGX ASI settled at 60,968.27(15 years all time high) by month end.
- On a sectoral basis, year-to-date performance remained positive across all sectors under our coverage. The Industrial Goods (+3.66% ytd), Consumer Goods (+51.93% ytd), Oil and Gas (+67.76% ytd), Insurance (+58.91% ytd), and Banking (+54.59% ytd) sectors all closed on a positive note.

FIXED INCOME

- In June 2023, the secondary fixed income market closed bullish as average yield fell by 41bps MoM to settle at 9.66%.
- Average stop rates at the NTB auctions in June 2023 fell by 13bps to 5.74% from 5.87% in May 2023. This is following improved demand in June 2023, as evidenced by the 52bps increase in average bid-to-cover ratio to 5.62x (vs 5.10x in May 2023). However, the secondary NT-Bills market closed on a bearish note as average yield advanced 16bps MoM to 6.34%.
- At the primary bond auction for June 2023, the DMO sold NGN427.15bn worth of bonds across one re-opening instrument (APR-2029) and three newly introduced instruments (JUN-2033, JUN-2038 and JUN-2053). The average stop rate declined by 18bps to 14.94% (vs. 15.12% at the May 2023 auction). Similarly, the secondary bonds market closed bullish as average yield dipped 98bps MoM to 12.98% in June 2023.



FUND STRUCTURE

OUTLOOK



GLOBAL MARKETS

In the global equities market in Q3:2023, stocks may face a challenging environment characterized by increased volatility and subdued total returns. Higher quality stocks may outperform. Non-US developed markets might outpace the US due to higher dividend yields and more attractive valuations. In the event of notable decline in growth, following further hikes, earnings may decline, and higher quality stocks may outperform growth stocks while growth stocks outperforms value stocks. The US dollar saw mixed sentiments In H1:2023 following a flurry of events. We foresee the USD weakening modestly on a trade-weighted basis. The Japanese yen may strengthen if the BoJ removes the yield curve control. The Euro may find relief from improved growth trajectory and interest rate convergence. The British pound and other economically sensitive currencies could come under pressure as geopolitical tension stirred in eastern Europe lingers amid elevated fear of recession.

DOMESTIC MARKETS

EQUITY

We expect sustained bullish sentiments in the equities market in July. We base our prognosis on the improved participation by foreign investors in the Nigerian bourse following the liberalization of activities in the equities market. Although we expect profit-taking activities from investors during the month given the historic rally seen in June. However, we believe that the bulls will remain dominant in the month of July. We advise investors to embrace fundamentally sound tickers in the sectors such as Consumer Goods, Banking, Oil and Gas and telecoms sectors as we see potentials in these sectors in the coming months.

FIXED INCOME

In the fixed income market, yields are expected to taper, given the expected buoyancy of the financial system liquidity amid the normalization of Cash Reserve Ratio (CRR), moderate maturity inflows, and improved FAAC allocation that accompanies the change in exchange rate and improving crude oil production volume.
