

Mutual Funds Factsheet August 2023



GLOBAL

- US CPI rose by 0.2% Year-on-Year (YoY) in July 2023 from 0.3% in the previous month signaling a slowdown in inflation. Core CPI rose by 2.0% in the same period.
- The S&P Global Flash US Manufacturing PMI fell to 47.0 points in August 2023 underpinning deterioration in operating conditions. However, the flash US PMI Composite Output index increased to 50.4 point indicating a fractional increase in output across the private sector.
- UK CPI rose by 6.8% YoY in July 2023 down from 7.9% YoY in June 2023. Month-on-Month (MoM), CPI fell by 0.4% within the period.
- The Eurozone PMI for manufacturing was 43.7 points in August 2023; a slight improvement from July however, it remained below the 50-point threshold indicating a contraction.
- The Global Equites market witnessed a bullish run, thus Year-to- Date (YtD) performance for indices under our coverage closed positive. S&P 500 (+17.40%), FTSEMIB (-20.41%), CAC 40 (+13.02%), DAX (+14.53%) STOXX (+13.27%), NIKKEI (+25.35%), SCHOMP (+0.99%).

DOMESTIC

- Headline inflation increased by 129bps YoY to 24.08% in July 2023 (vs. 22.79% in June 2023). The surge in Headline inflation is on the back of a jump in Food inflation (+173bps to 26.98%) and Core inflation (+41bps to 20.47%).
- Nigeria's GDP grew by 2.51% YoY in Q2:2023. The Oil sector contracted by 13.43% YoY in Q2:2023 (vs. -4.21% YoY in Q1:2023) while the Non-Oil sector grew by 3.58% YoY (vs. 2.77% YoY in Q1:2023) in the period.
- Based on its recently released audited financial statements, CBN's Profit After Tax (PAT) declined by 2.97% between 2016 and 2022 to NGN103.85bn in 2022 compared to NGN124.47bn in 2016. Furthermore, external reserves grew to NGN14.94trn (USD37.08bn) in 2022 from NGN8.35trn in 2016. However, following the revelation of several foreign obligations, there is cause to believe that external reserves might be lower than reported.
- In the Nigeria Labor Force Survey published by the NBS in August 2023, unemployment rate declined to 4.1% in Q1:2023 (vs. 5.3% in Q4:2022). Also, the underemployment rate decreased to 12.2% in Q1: 2023 (vs. 13.7% in Q4:2022). This follows a significant adjustment to the collection and computation methodology.

FINANCIAL MARKET UPDATE

FIXED INCOME

Primary Market

- Average stop rates at the NTB auctions in August 2023 increased by 157bps to 7.98% (vs. 6.41% in July 2023). This was despite the rise in demand for the instruments as average bid-to-cover ratio surged by 207bps to 5.26x (vs. 3.19x in July 2023).
- At the primary bond auction for August 2023, the Debt Management Office (DMO) sold NGN227.76bn worth of bonds across four re-opening instruments. However, demand declined as the average bid-to-cover ratio plunged by 176bps to 0.87x (vs. 2.63x at the last auction). Consequently, the average stop rate rose by 135bps to 14.98% (vs. 13.63% at the last auction).

Secondary Market

In August 2023, the secondary fixed income market closed bearish as average yield rose by 55bps MoM to settle at 10.67%. Similarly, the secondary NT-Bills and Bond market closed on a negative note as average yield advanced 15bps MoM and 96bps MoM each to 7.27% and 14.06% respectively.

EQUITIES

- The NGX All-Share Index (ASI) gained 344bps MoM to settle at 66,548.99 points. Consequently, the Year-to-Date (YtD) return printed at 29.85% (vs. 25.53% in July 2023).
- The market's performance was spurred by positive returns in the Industrial Goods (+0.57% MoM), Consumer Goods (+24.51% MoM), Insurance (+3.08% MoM) and Oil and Gas (+0.91% MoM) sectors, while Banking sector (-1.99% MoM) closed in the red.

GLOBAL MARKETS

GLOBAL ECONOMY

In August 2023, the spate of disinflation continues as most advanced economies continue to record slow down in the inflation direction. Following this, we have observed a change in market expectation towards subsequent monetary policy action direction. In the US, analyst consensus still suggests that the FED fund rates will remain unchanged in the remaining part of 2023. Inflation data continues to suggest the plausibility of more hikes, while the unemployment data remains a major concern at 3.8% YoY in August 2023. Similarly, the ECB is expected to slow down the pace of monetary tightening as the impact of the series done so far reflects on the manufacturing PMI data.

GLOBAL EQUITIES

For the global equities market, we opine that the expectation of a slowdown in interest rate hikes and inflationary pressures will anchor sustained positive performance in the market in the latter part of 2023. Contextually, major central banks have hinted on taking a pause on interest rate hikes. We expect this to improve investor sentiment and drive traction towards the market in the short to medium term.

DOMESTIC MARKETS

EQUITY

We expect the earnings season and dividend hunting activities to continue to spur positive sentiment in the space in September. Notably, companies in the banking sector would be filing their financial statements late. On a balance of factor, we expect that the market would end September in the negatives.

FIXED INCOME

In the fixed income market, asides expectation of liquidity rally in the first week of September, following FAAC disbursement, we expect liquidity to stay moderate for the later part of the month given CBN's stance on liquidity clampdown. Hence, we opine that average yields would increase from the August 2023 levels.
